SCHOOL ACCESSIBILITY POLICY AND PLAN

Aims of the Accessibility Plan

This plan outlines how Bishopswood Schools Federation aims to improve access to education for pupils with disabilities as required by the planning duties in the Equality Act 2010.

A person has a disability if they have a physical or mental impairment that has a substantial and long-term adverse effect on their ability to carry out normal day-to-day activities.

This plan aims to:

- Increase the extent to which pupils with disabilities can participate in the curriculum.
- Improve the physical environment of the school to enable pupils with disabilities to take better advantage of education, benefits, facilities and services provided.
- Improve the availability of accessible information to pupils with disabilities.

The governing body also recognises its responsibility towards employees with disabilities and will:

- Monitor recruitment procedures to ensure that individuals with disabilities are provided with equal opportunities.
- Provide appropriate support and provision for employees with disabilities to ensure that they can carry out their work effectively without barriers.
- Undertake reasonable adjustments to enable staff to access the workplace.

The plan will be resourced, implemented, reviewed and revised in consultation with:

- Pupil's parents.
- The Executive head teacher/Head of School and other relevant members of staff.
- Governors.
- External Parties.

This plan is reviewed every three years to take into account the changing needs of the school and its pupils. The plan is also reviewed where the school has undergone a refurbishment.

The School's Context

Bishopswood Schools Federation comprises of Bishopswood Infant School and Bishopswood Junior School. The schools are both mainstream schools and provide education for pupils aged 4-11 years old. The school comprises of two school buildings on a single level. Both schools have internal emergency signage and escape routes are clearly marked. All classrooms have external doors and lead to accessible routes to the playground.

Infant School

Currently there is access for disabled persons through the reception area, rear of the infant hall and classrooms 1,2 and 3. All access /egress locations have a small lip (max 50mm waterstop) to them so could led to the persons requiring assistance to enter the building. The access / egress points to classrooms 4, 5, 6 and external door to corridor by classroom 6 have steps. The site management team maintain yellow bands along the edges of the steps. The requirement to convert the steps to a slope will be reviewed as required.

There is a disability accessible toilet in reception. The reception toilet is fitted with an emergency pull cord.

<u>**Iunior School**</u>

Currently all external access / egress doors with the exception of the external doors from the lower and upper school cloakrooms have a small lip (max 50mm waterstop) to them so could lead to the persons requiring assistance to enter the building. The site management team maintain yellow bands along the edges of the steps. The requirement to convert the steps to a slope will be reviewed as required.

The Accessibility Audit

- 1. The governing body will undertake a regular Accessibility Audit.
- 2. The audit will cover the following three areas:
 - a. **Access to the curriculum** the governing body will assess the extent to which pupils with disabilities can access the curriculum on an equal basis with their peers.
 - b. **Assess to physical environment** the governing body will assess the extent to which pupils with disabilities can access the physical environment on an equal basis with their peers.
 - c. **Access to information** the governing body will assess the extent to which pupils with disabilities can access information on an equal basis with their peers.
- 3. When conducting the audit, the governing body will consider all kinds of disabilities and impairments, including, but not limited to, the following:
 - a. **Ambulatory disability** this includes pupils who use a wheelchair or mobility aid.
 - b. **Dexterity disa**bilities this includes those whose everyday manual handling of objects and fixtures may be impaired.
 - c. **Visual disabilities** this includes those with visual impairments and sensitivities.
 - d. **Auditory disabilities** this includes those with hearing impairments and sensitivities.
 - e. **Comprehension** this includes hidden disabilities, such as autism and dyslexia.
- 4. The findings from the audit will be used to identify short, medium and long term actions to address specific gaps and improve access.
- 5. All actions will be carried out in a reasonable timeframe, and after taking into account pupils' disabilities and preferences of the parents.
- 6. The actions that will be undertaken are detailed in the following sections of this document.
